**KPC** So you were telling me that you did a degree in Early Modern

History.

MD Yes.

**KPC** Why did you choose that?

MD I actually went up to do Environmental Science and panicked about

three weeks into the course.

**KPC** [laughs] Right.

MD Because I thought the Mathematics would have been too much for

me.

**KPC** Mm.

**MD** Because I done a, as I say, I done a foundation course...

**KPC** Mm-mm.

**MD** ... and struggled with Mathematics, you know.

**KPC** Mm.

MD So I panicked and I looked around and I thought, 'Right, I'll just go

for an easy one' and...

**KPC** And did you ever regret doing Early Modern History?

**MD** No, I didn't, because I, I, I love reading, anyway. I love reading...

**KPC** Mm.

**MD** ... you know, about History.

**KPC** Mm-mm.

MD And I ended up going... I went and did a Postgraduate Diploma then

in Adult and Continuing Education.

**KPC** Mm-mm.

**MD** Which is the sort of game I'm in now, you know.

**KPC** Right, so who do you work for?

**MD** I work for Derry Youth and Community Workshops, a training

organisation.

**KPC** Mm-mm.

**MD** In Derry, you know. I'm a tutor there.

**KPC** And what kinds of things do you do?

MD Well, it's... I get people in. I'm supposed to be a, a Literacy and

Numeracy Adv...Assessor...

**KPC** Mm-mm.

MD ... but in reality, I run a two week job search course for people who

are made to do it through New Deal, you know.

**KPC** Oh, right, okay.

MD So anybody comes in my door on a Monday morning doesn't want

to be there, you know.

**KPC** No, I'm sure they don't.

**MD** It's... they're forced to do it, you know. So...

**KPC** Mm.

**MD** It's more diplomacy in keeping them there, than it is anything else...

**KPC** Mm.

**MD** ... you know, that sort of way.

**KPC** And how...?

**MD** But it's a very enjoyable job.

**KPC** Aye.

MD You know, I'm a... I practically know everybody in Derry, because

of the job, you know.

**KPC** Aye.

**MD** It's great like. I get free taxi rides everywhere.

**KPC** [laughs]

**MD** Free, free... When my mates go into pubs with me, I, I get free pints

bought to me and...

**KPC** A wee drink. [laughs]

**MD** 'What is it? What is it with you?' you know. 'Well, they're *New* 

Deal pints. I'm sorry,' you know, sort of.

**KPC** Well, I suppose it is true that, you know, in a sense, you're really

doing a favour for them.

**MD** Well, the thing about it is, the, the Dole knows that half of Derry is

still doing the double.

**KPC** Mm.

MD And I get guys in, on a Monday morning going, 'Me old mucker. I

have to work,' and I'm going, 'You don't work on my shift. I don't care what you do. It's not my job to tell the Dole that you're doing

the double...'

KPC No.

**MD** ... I says, 'But if you're caught doing the double, you'll get done for

doing the double.'

KPC Mm.

**MD** 'I'll get done for fraud. This organisation will lose its contract.'

**KPC** Mm.

MD 'I cou....I could go to jail for it. You know what I mean?' So,

generally they're fine about it, you know. But...

**KPC** Mm.

MD ... see some of the people that come in, like I had a guy in about six

months ago...

**KPC** Mm-mm.

MD ... and he... I could see him big fellah. you know I could see him

squaring up, you know. I thought, 'What the fuck is he going to say?' you know. 'Ah, come here [abbreviated] mucker, I'm

working.' I says, 'Well, you're not. Go on down and tell the Dole,' I said, 'and sure let me know what they say when, when you come

up again'.

**KPC** Mm-mm.

MD And that knocked the stuffing out of him, you know. I said, 'Look,

get a cup of coffee and I'll get a chat with you.'

KPC Mm.

**MD** He lands on me, he goes, eh, 'Could the wife not do this?' I says,

'Does she look exactly like you, does she?' And he went, 'No'. I says, 'Well, no, the fucking wife can't do this,' you know. Wanted to send his wife up so he could get out to work, you know. Crazy

like.

**KPC** Unbelievable.

MD Aye, people up there, you know, they're desperate to get out to

work, you know, and like...

**KPC** And what other things have they don.... have they got up to that

you've discovered afterwards?

MD 'Oh, go and phone so-and-so, eh, tell him to come in. He's on a

visit tomorrow [pronounced as 'the morra'] from the Dole, a New

Deal.' I...I'd have a list of numbers, so I phone this guy.

**KPC** Uh-huh.

MD 'Shifty', he's called, his nickname. You know, as you can imagine -

'Shifty'...

**KPC** [laughs]

MD 'What, Séamus?' 'Do you think you can be here about quarter past

ten tomorrow [pronounced as 'the morra']?' Because we have to brief them on what they say, you know, before they get interviewed

by the Dole.

**KPC** I know.

MD 'That's going to be difficult, Séamus.' I says, 'Why?' He says, 'I'm

on a fag run in Lanzarote.' They were buying hooky fags in

Lanzarote, you know. They be up... you know, black economy, they

get up to all sorts of things, you know.

**KPC** And is there would there be much of a black economy in Derry, do

you think?

**MD** Oh, big style, aye.

**KPC** Why is that, do you think?

MD I don't know. Th...th....There's still a very high unemployment in

Derry.

**KPC** Mm.

MD You see, the the, there's been no benefits from the cease-fire in

terms of, like, Belfast, as you can s... have you been back to Belfast?

**KPC** Is buzzing.

**MD** It's just a sea of cranes.

**KPC** Aye.

**MD** There's nothing. Derry hasn't... there's been no real economic

benefit.

**KPC** And why is that? Why do think it's been...?

MD Ah, it's been... there's always been a focus, and Derry people have

always thought that West of the Bann. The Unionist Government's

never looked West of the Bann, you know.

**KPC** Aye, true enough.

MD And then, you know, Direct, you know, Government in Britain now,

they, they didn't bother too much either, you know.

**KPC** Mm.

**MD** And then, you know, Derry's traditional industries are... they're

long gone, you know. And they're never going to be replaced, you

know.

KPC Mm.

**MD** I think Derry's last shirt factory shut about three weeks ago, four

weeks ago.

**KPC** Was it really....?

**MD** A wee specialised shirt factory, bang, gone, you know,

**KPC** Oh, isn't that sad?

**MD** But that was a...

**KPC** Because that's, you know, in a sense, that was Derry's whole thing,

wasn't it?

**MD** That was Derry's thing, surely. The women [pronounced as

'weemen'] went out and worked, and the men...

KPC Mm.

**MD** ... walked the dogs, as they say in the song, you know.

**KPC** Yeah. But your mummy didn't have time for, for working.

MD No, my mummy did not. My mother had five daughters and two

sons to look after.

**KPC** And are they all still alive?

**MD** Aye, aye. My mother's dead now.

**KPC** Aye.

**MD** About five years. And my, my father died...

**KPC** What about your dad?

**MD** ... when I was ten, you know.

**KPC** Ach, that's...

**MD** So we were very young when dad died, you know.

**KPC** ... very hard, isn't it?

**MD** It was hard on my mother, you know.

**KPC** Desperate hard on her.
