

29mfm Discord guidance

- 1. To sign up for Discord, you just need an invite. We will send the invite in an email to the 29mfm email list. We are not going to put this on the mfm website, because then anyone could find it and start spamming us. The invite will take you to Discord's website. If you already have a Discord account, you should simply be taken directly to the 29mfm Discord server. If not, you will need to set up an account (it's free and quick). We advise you to download the Discord app/client (although you may well be able to use the web-based version of Discord). You can, of course, delete your account after the mfm.
- 2. We will be using Discord for two purposes during the 29mfm: (i) to store posters and also slides or handouts from talks (as a repository, so that people have easy access to them), and (ii) as a way to have chat-type communication during the conference. The 29mfm has a Discord 'server' which has lots of text-based 'channels', organised in line with the conference programme.
- 3. Discord will also allow us, if we like, to discuss a poster or talk after the poster session or talk session has happened (or, even, in advance of it if you're keen). We will close the 29mfm Discord server a week or so after the conference (and we will let you know in advance when that will be). Each poster and talk has its own channel on the 29mfm Discord server. The idea is for people to upload their slides, handout or poster to their channel, and anyone attending the conference could use the channel to post questions for the presenter in the channel's chat (and the presenter can respond, of course, too). If you want to, you could have a chat about a presentation in this way. We will upload the poster-videos to each poster channel before the conference, so you can watch them through Discord. (On some versions of Discord there are two options when you hover over a video-link: clicking on the 'play' symbol, on the left, makes a video play in Discord, and clicking on the other symbol, on the right, will open the video in Youtube.)
- 4. We are, therefore, asking all presenters to upload their own slides, handout or poster to their own Discord channel. Please do! If you are giving a talk or poster, you should be able to find your channel pretty straightforwardly (all the necessary channels already exist). The server is set up in terms of the 'sessions' on the programme (so all the talks in talk session 1A are grouped together, for example, as are all the posters in poster session 1). Channels are named using the surname of presenters. You just need to find your channel and post your file to it. You do this by clicking on the '+' symbol in the chat/message box at the bottom of a channel. If you click the '+', you should be able to upload a file in the normal file-uploading manner. You can type a message to accompany the file, too. NB: Discord can only host files up to 8MB. If your file is bigger than 8MB, you could try to reduce it (use lower quality images?) or host it elsewhere and post a link to Discord.
- 5. Everyone can add messages to a channel just by typing in the box and hitting the enter key. This way, you can chat about a presentation. You can delete your own messages, too, if you make a mistake (click on the three dots that appear when you hover over your message at least, that works for me).
- 6. There are a number of editors for the Discord site. We can delete other people's messages, too. We will only do this if someone posts something inappropriate. We can also remove people from the server, which again we will only do if they behave inappropriately. If you notice any inappropriate behaviour on Discord, please let us know in the 'general-queries' channel. And, please, be nice to everyone!
- 7. You can also post general queries in the 'general-queries' channel (hence the name...). If you can't figure out anything related to the conference (about Zoom or Discord or anything), please ask about it in this 'general-queries' channel in Discord. Don't send an email it might not be picked up. We will try to check the 'general-queries' channel often, but everyone should feel free to answer queries there if you know an answer to someone's question.
- 8. NB: Discord was invented in order to let people talk to each other while playing online games. This means that it sometimes uses young-person-speak, so you may be surprised how it speaks to you (in its automated replies and messages). We'll cope.
- 9. You can rename yourself easily and add a picture of yourself and that kind of thing. You may get notifications from Discord about messages. If you look in your profile, you should be able to turn this off. If you want/like, you can send other people a private message through Discord just click on their name (in the 'online' section of the screen) and type it in the 'message' box.
