- **SC** The corn was sowed first of all in the spring.
- Int. Mm-hm.
- **SC** Then it grew on to August, the harvest time.
- Int. Mm-hm.
- SC It was cut then with a, if you were well off you had a machine for cutting it, you know, and putting it off and
- Int. Mm-hm.
- you had to generally open the field first with a scythe for room for the horses and the machine to go round.
- Int. Sure, aye.
- And then you, you [put it] off in sheaves and tied the sheaves up and then you stooked them. You put four together and put a band round the top of them [to keep them] standing.
- **Int.** Aye. Uh-huh.
- **SC** Then the crows, they'd tackle them.
- **Int.** Is that right?
- **SC** You'd have to put up a scarecrow.
- Int. Uh-huh.
- **SC** They eat, they eat the seeds, do you see.
- **Int.** Oh, aye, uh-huh, yes.
- So then, if it was, if it was a middling year, you'd lump it. That's put it in wee, wee piles [XX] kind of rucks.
- Int. Uh-huh.
- And then when you'd think it was good enough you'd draw it into the haggard and put it in big stacks.
- **Int.** Mm-hm. Into the haggard?
- **SC** Aye.
- **Int.** Uh-huh. You built it in stacks then.
- **SC** You built it in stacks then. Then you had to turn round and cut rushes to thatch it.
- Int. Right, uh-huh.
- **SC** And you had to twist ropes made out of hay

Int. Uh-huh.

**SC** To keep the thatch on, you know, you went round them.

Int. Aye.
